“This site is designed to help you manage **communications** during a crisis. The dairy industry defines a crisis as an incident or situation that has an immediate and widespread impact on consumer confidence in and consumption of dairy products, or on the well-being of dairy producers. Dairy industry crises could include:

- Outbreaks of foreign animal diseases, such as foot-and-mouth disease (FMD)
- Multi-state outbreaks of food-borne illnesses linked to dairy products
- Terrorist attacks impacting the milk supply or dairy farms

Our goal as an industry is to [speak with one voice](#) and effectively reassure consumers during a crisis.”
